EDISTO RECIPES




Caramel Candy with Nuts

- 1/4 cup butter
- 1 tsp butter to grease pan with
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup light corn syrup
- 1 cup evaporated milk
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 1 tsp vanilla extract

Line a 9 inch pan with foil and grease with 1 tsp butter. In large saucepan, combine sugar, corn syrup, milk and 1/4 cup butter and cook while stirring over medium heat until at soft-ball stage (238° on candy thermometer). At this point wash down sides of pan to get rid of sugar crystals, if formed, with a pastry brush dipped in water. Continue cooking and stirring until thermometer reads 248°. Remove from heat and stir in nuts and vanilla and pour into 9 inch pan. Let stand until firm.

Lift out of pan with foil. Remove the foil and cut candy into 1 inch squares using a buttered knife. You can drizzle with melted chocolate if desired. Let stand until set. Enjoy!

MINUTES
September 14, 2017
REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING
6:00 P.M.

Present: Jane S. Darby, Mayor, Susan Hornsby, Mayor Pro Tempore, Jerome Kizer, Crawford Moore, and Patti Smyer, Council Members;
Quorum of Council Present.

Mayor Darby called the meeting to order. Mayor Pro Tem Hornsby led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance and an invocation.

Approval of Minutes

A. Regular Council Meeting Minutes, August 10, 2017 – Mayor Pro Tem Hornsby moved to approve the minutes of the regular Council meeting held on August 10, 2017, seconded by Councilman Moore and approved unanimously.

B. Special Council Meeting Minutes, August 29, 2017 – Councilwoman Smyer moved to approve the minutes of the special Council meeting held on August 29, 2017, seconded by Councilman Kizer and unanimously approved.

Proclamations and Presentations

Starfish Awards:

Ray Messer – Over the past two months, Ray Messer has assisted the Public Works department by fixing 3 different pieces of landscape equipment; saw, blower and weed eater. In previous vocations he has been trained to work on such equipment. This is not a part of his job responsibilities in the Utilities Department, however, when pockets of down time would present he strategically worked on the equipment and got them up and running.

Mike Kelly – Mr. Kelly assisted the Public Works department by retrieving a bag of rope fence that was disposed of by mistake in the compactor.

Westbank Construction – After Westbank had completed the beach accesses, the Town experienced severe rain events that eroded the stabilizing sand. Westbank saw that this had happened and repaired the work with no request from the Town.

Old Business

A. Second Reading of Ordinance No. 2017-22 Providing for Mobile Vending and

Regulations Governing Mobile Vending – Because of Hurricane Matthew recovery efforts, the sunset clause for mobile vending was not extended and did sunset (terminate) December 31, 2016. Ordinance No. 2017-22 removes the sunset clause and addresses other issues in the mobile vending language such as “mobile’ means the state of being active.” Mayor Pro Tem Hornsby moved to approve the second reading of Ordinance No. 2017-22 Providing for Mobile Vending and Regulations Governing Mobile Vending, seconded by Councilwoman Smyer and unanimously approved.

B. Resolution No. 2017-R12 to Adopt the Local Comprehensive Beachfront Management Plan – Mayor Pro Tem Hornsby moved to defer Resolution No. 2017-R12 to Adopt the Local Comprehensive Beachfront Management Plan, seconded by Councilman Kizer and approved unanimously.

C. Second Reading of Ordinance No. 2017-25 to Adjust the Rollback Millage Fiscal Year 2017-18 – Colleton County has provided the reassessment information needed to calculate the rollback millage according to South Carolina Code 23-7-251. According to the calculation, the millage rate needs to be adjusted from 20.71 to 23.44 to maintain the same property tax revenue as budgeted based on declining assessed values. Councilman Moore moved to approve the second reading of Ordinance No. 2017-25 to Adjust the Rollback Millage Fiscal Year 2017-18, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Hornsby and unanimously approved.

New Business/Appearances

A. Town Accomplishments Fiscal Year 2016-17 – Councilman Moore moved to defer this item until the October meeting, seconded by Councilwoman Smyer and unanimously approved.

B. First Reading of Ordinance No. 2017-24 Division 2 – Protection of Sea Turtles – Mayor Pro Tem Hornsby moved to defer this item until the October meeting, seconded by Councilman Kizer and approved unanimously.

C. Special Event Application – Town of Edisto Beach – Hurricane Matthew and Volunteer Appreciation Celebration, October 7, 2017 – Councilman Kizer moved to approve the request of the Town of Edisto Beach to hold the Volunteer Appreciation Celebration on October 7, 2017 at Bay Creek Park, seconded by Councilman Moore and approved unanimously. This is funded by donations.

D. Emergency Purchase Order Lift Station A

– One of the two pumps at Lift Station A located at the intersection of Sea Cloud Circle and King Cotton failed. Because of this failure, the Utilities Department has had a by-pass pump at this location. Both pumps are scheduled to be replaced by Tencarva at a cost of \$13,028 funded by Sewer Renewal and Replacement. Councilwoman Smyer moved to approve the emergency purchase order for Lift Station A, seconded by Councilman Moore and unanimously approved.

E. Change Order No. 1 Terry Hoff Construction - \$1,036

– This change order is a result of the addition of handrails at a cost of \$1,036. The contract amount was \$72,261.25 of which \$185 was for permit fees which was not billed. The difference is \$851.00 to be funded from Hospitality Funds. Councilman Moore moved to approve Change Order No. 1 from Terry Hoff Construction in the amount of \$1,036, seconded by Councilwoman Smyer and approved unanimously.

F. First Reading of Ordinance No. 2017-26 to Enact Article III of Chapter 78 of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Edisto Beach, Entitled "Golf Cart"

– Councilman Moore moved to defer the first reading of Ordinance No. 2017-26 to Enact Article III of Chapter 78 of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Edisto Beach entitled "Golf Cart" seconded by Councilwoman Smyer and unanimously approved.

G. Special Event Application – Edisto Chamber of Commerce – 2017 Fall Festival

– Councilwoman Smyer moved to approve the special event application from the Edisto Chamber of Commerce to hold the 2017 Fall Festival on October 21, 2017 from 11:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. seconded by Councilman Kizer and approved 4 -0 with Mayor Pro Tem Hornsby recused.

H. First Reading of Ordinance No. 2017-27 to Amend Sections 14-110(a), 14-114(d), 14-114(h) of the Town of Edisto Beach Code of Ordinances, this Ordinance shall take effect December 21, 2017

– Mayor Pro Tem Hornsby moved to approve the first reading of Ordinance No. 2017-27 to amend sections 14-110(a), 14-114(d), and 14-114(h) seconded by Councilman Kizer and unanimously approved. The flood maps will go into effect on December 21, 2017, and the Building Code Official, will give property owners their rating if they request it.

I. Temporary Construction and Permanent Utility Easement Agreement

– Councilman Moore moved to approve the temporary

construction and permanent utility easement agreement for TMS# 354-12-00-137.000, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Hornsby and approved unanimously.

J. First Reading of Ordinance 2017-28 to Amend Sections 14-111(a), 14-111(b), 14-111(c), 14-111(d), 14-111(e), 14-113, 14-221(b)(1), 14-221(j) of the Town of Edisto Beach Code of Ordinances

– Councilman Kizer moved to approve first reading of Ordinance 2017-28, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Hornsby and unanimously approved.

K. Emergency Purchase – Generator Well 6

– The generator at well #6 was damaged as a result of Hurricane Irma. Councilwoman Smyer moved to approve the emergency purchase of a generator for well 6, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Hornsby and approved unanimously.

L. Agreement between the Town of Edisto Beach and the South Carolina Department of Transportation (First Push and Debris Removal)

– Administrator Hill told Council and those in attendance that the Town has been negotiating with the Department of Transportation for removal of sand from Palmetto Boulevard, which is a state road. The question was what to do with the sand after it was placed on the beach accesses. After discussion with the Secretary of DOT, an agreement was reached that DOT would be responsible for paying for the entire project. Councilwoman Smyer moved to approve the agreement between the Town of Edisto Beach and the South Carolina Department of Transportation for the first push and debris removal, seconded by Councilman Kizer and unanimously approved.

M. Agreement between the Town of Edisto Beach and Westbank Construction – Emergency Berm

– This agreement is necessary due to Hurricane Irma. The berm that was in place prior to Irma slowed down wave action mitigating structural damages, and it needs to be replaced as quickly as possible. Councilman Kizer moved to approve the agreement between the Town of Edisto Beach and Westbank Construction for the emergency berm, seconded by Councilwoman Smyer and approved unanimously.

N. First Reading of Ordinance No. 2017-29 to Amend the FY 2017-18 Budget

– Administrator Hill stated that damage estimates will be approximately \$500,000 for debris removal that FEMA will not cover at this time. This requires the budget be amended. Councilman Moore moved to approve the first reading of Ordinance No. 2017-29 to Amend the FY 2017-18 Budget, seconded by

Mayor Pro Tem Hornsby and unanimously approved.

Audience member Cathie Brown suggested that sand bags be made available in preparation of future storms. "A lot of pre-emptive work would alleviate a lot of this collection. There is a site for Channel 2 news that tells you exactly how to do it, to protect your investment. I would think that maybe the Town could put that information out there and it might alleviate a lot of that." Mayor Darby asked Ms. Brown to discuss her ideas further with Building Codes Official Patrick Brown.

O. Emergency Purchase – Lift Station B – Councilwoman Smyer moved to approve the emergency purchase for lift station B due to Hurricane Irma, seconded by Councilman Moore and unanimously approved.

Committee Vacancies

A. Zoning Board of Appeals – 1 vacancy – Councilman Kizer moved to approve the application of Sally Altman for the remaining vacancy on the Zoning Board of Appeals, seconded by Councilwoman Smyer and approved unanimously.
